WACOSS acknowledges that we work across the lands of the Indigenous Peoples of Western Australia and respects the continuing cultural connections and Traditional Owners of this country.



CEO'S REPORT

This year has marked the beginning of a new phase for the WA Council of Social Service, under a new Strategic Plan focused on our mission to advocate for social change to improve the well-being of Western Australians and strengthen the community services sector that supports them.

The Council recognised the need to re-focus our efforts and sustain the gains we have made in recent years, in the face of diminishing revenues and increasing competition for resources. During tight times, it is more important than ever for the sector to maintain the strength that comes from unity, cooperation and coordination. I am always so encouraged by the level of support of the Council's membership, not only for the work of WACOSS, but for each other and the broader sector.

Our new Strategic Plan has focused on our strengths as a Council, and the important and unique role that we play as a champion for social well-being and community resilience for all Western Australians. It shapes priorities for how we can sustain a vibrant community services sector, responsive to the needs of our diverse communities, and support the collective efforts of our members to shape civil society.

This year, the Council has observed that during tight economic times, government agencies and community services are rationalising their expenditure more tightly than ever, and there is a risk of retreating to what is perceived as 'core business.' We have been focused on ensuring that the risk of such a retreat doesn't undermine important gains that have been made in recent years in driving more collaborative and coordinated efforts, nor widen the gaps in the service landscape, resulting in more people falling through the cracks and missing out. Our Pre-Budget Submission is focused on calling for action and targeted investment to counter this risk.

Despite our weakening economic performance, Western Australia remains a strong and prosperous state, capable of moving towards our vision of an inclusive, just and equitable society. Poverty and inequality are not inevitable. The fact that inequality continues to grow in our state is a result of the collective decisions and policies of successive Governments and reversing this trend must become a higher priority in order to leave no one behind.

The WA Council of Social Service plays an important and unique role in the Western Australian community as a strong voice for social justice and wellbeing and we are proud to work alongside the diverse and committed mission-driven organisations that make up our membership. I'd like to thank all our members for their ongoing support.

I would also especially like to thank all the talented and hard-working staff who continue to represent the sector in all their undertakings with diligence and professionalism. Finally, can I acknowledge the strategic leadership that our Board have once again provided for our team and the sector at large, which has supported me with such valued mentorship and guidance not only this year, but throughout my years with the Council.

I hope you enjoy reflecting on the achievements of the Council over the past year, and are motivated to sustain your commitment to the Council for the years to come.

60TH ANNIVERSARY



TIME TO CELEBRATE

This is a year for WACOSS and the community sector to celebrate. It's time to reflect back on the milestones and achievements of WACOSS over the past sixty years as well as recognise the contributions from individuals and organisations to WACOSS and the wider community over this journey.

We've come a long way from 16 March 1956 when the Lord Mayor of Perth, along with eleven people representing fifty organisations, moved that a "Western Australian Council of Social Welfare Agencies" be formed. That meeting, with its auspicious motion, has been hailed as the official start of WACOSS.

The people and milestones are too numerous to mention. The first two decades were the formative years, where pioneers such as Irene Glasson, Gwin

Ruston, Dr Colin Anderson and Prof Eric Saint had tremendous influence on the welfare of our community with the establishment of WACOSS and development of a clear social agenda.

WACOSS have grown from being a group of voluntary organisations developing our first welfare services, to a leading peak body representing and advocating to government on behalf of the community and the services that support it. The community sector saw significant social change in the 70s, political activism in the 80s, then reforms and investment in the following decades. In recent times WACOSS has been leading social policy development and building stronger relationships with government and industry to create the strong voice for our most disadvantaged and vulnerable citizens we see in the present day.

We have dug through the dusty archives to build a better picture of this history to share in this anniversary year. A history of WACOSS booklet will be available in printed and digital form following the WACOSS Annual General Meeting on 28 October 2016.

2015-16 HIGHLIGHTS

NEW YEAR SECTOR BREAKFAST

Glorious summer weather and the beautiful setting at Mt Eliza House, Kings Park was again the setting for the annual WACOSS New Year Sector Breakfast. The breakfast was held on 22 January 2016 and attended by approximately 180 people including numerous members and guests from the government, a wide cross-section of the community sector, as well as stakeholders from the corporate sector.

The breakfast is to thank and acknowledge the work of WACOSS members and community sector services and their staff, and marks the commencement of another year of the sector making a difference in our community.

We were privileged to have Barry McGuire, a strong Noongar leader and custodian with ancestral links to the Balladong and Wadjuk regions, deliver an inspiring Welcome to Country. The Hon Tony Simpson MLA then thanked everyone for their tremendous contributions to the community and took the opportunity to launch the Community Service Excellence Awards which are delivered on a biennial basis in partnership with WACOSS, with Lotterywest as principal supporter.



WACOSS President, Steve Joske took the opportunity to reflect on achievements and milestones that occurred throughout 2015 while CEO, Irina Cattalini provided the guests with an insight into what was planned and anticipated to happen in the year ahead.

CONNECTING COMMUNITIES FOR KIDS



Following a period of comprehensive research, planning and co-design, Connecting Communities for Kids (CCK), a place-based collective impact initiative involving the Kwinana and Cockburn communities, received funding of \$2 million over five years to improve outcomes in early childhood development and care.

CCK is focused on empowering parents and local communities to work together to make a lasting difference in the lives of children pre-birth to eight and their families. Its goal is for young children to have the same level of physical, social, emotional, communication and language development as the Perth metropolitan area by 2024.

CCK has a unique contemporary governance structure comprising a Joint Commissioning Committee of senior State Government and community sector representatives who have the capacity to re-direct funding to align with its Roadmap for Change; and a Joint Leadership Team comprised of locally based services and stakeholders, including family and community members and smaller, sector specific working groups.

A Partnership Director has been appointed and the initiative is focusing on data sharing across key agencies to provide valuable information about how to effectively use resources to maximise collaboration, streamline services, identify gaps and duplication of effort, and ensure delivery of services for young children is targeted and relevant.

WACOSS NETWORKING DAY

& CONFERENCE

THE WAY AHEAD: LEAVE NO-ONE BEHIND

The 2016 Conference and Sector Networking Day titled "The Way Ahead: Leave No-One Behind" was held at The Pan Pacific Hotel on 3–5 May 2016. A total of 346 delegates from 189 organisations attended the conference and networking day. The conference was extremely successful, bringing together a range of stakeholders across the sector, business and government to discuss current and emerging trends that are impacting on the lives of West Australians.

Key topics included the UN Sustainable
Development Goals, inclusive development,
closing the gaps on Indigenous disadvantage,
social investment models, place-based and
collective impact approaches, citizen engagement
in service co-design, lived experience of poverty,
regional reform and remote communities, family
violence and financial abuse.

The conference provided the whole community services sector across WA with the rare opportunity to gather together to promote collaborative practice, share new service models, discuss emerging social policy issues in depth, showcase their innovative work and inspire our workers.



The Premier, Hon Colin Barnett presented the opening address to the conference and reflected on the relationship between his government and

the community sector as embodied by the Partnership Forum.

The Leader of the Opposition, Hon Mark McGowan presented the opening address on the second day and released Labor's *Supporting Communities* policy.


These Awards are now in their 18th year. A total of 98 outstanding nominations were received demonstrating the breadth and expertise of our



CORPORATE SERVICES

The ever changing environment of funding, services and outcomes saw the timely development of the Council's latest strategic plan, which will take WACOSS through to 2020. To keep us focused on our vision of an inclusive, just and equitable society, we've determined four strategic priorities that will operationally drive the organisation.

The 2015-2016 financial year has been one of considerable change and uncertainty for our members, with sweeping reforms and budget cuts which affected almost every organisation in the community sector. Despite these challenges, membership has remained strong with only a small dip in membership numbers to 286. This result is demonstrative of the resilience and commitment of our member network towards building an inclusive, just and equitable society now and in the future. 






WACOSS STAFF DEVELOPMENT



The Council has again provided its own staff development program this year, with three sessions held to challenge the staff about how they think of their environment and workplace.

For the first activity of the financial year we engaged an external team building firm, Achieving Synergy, to develop activities and challenges that involved splitting into teams and



solving problems and completing tasks around Fremantle. Some interesting and innovative solutions came to the fore when all teams met to be assessed at the end of the afternoon.

Matilda Bay, Crawley was the setting for our second activity of the year. Reconciliation WA had recently relocated to premises on the bay which is steeped in Aboriginal history. WACOSS enlisted the help of the inspiring Noongar leader and custodian, Shaun Nannup to educate the staff in the many stories surrounding the Matilda Bay area.


Our most recent staff development undertaking was the Aboriginal theatre company Yirra Yaakin's production of So Long, Suckers. A collaboration with Broome's Bunuba Cultural Enterprises, the play explored the complex relationships between alcoholism, intergenerational trauma, and cultural theft. By engaging with this production, WACOSS staff received a deeper understanding of these issues and the history underpinning them, whilst simultaneously supporting a unique and important intersection of the arts with community services.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY **2015-16**

The financial position of the Council remains stable with net assets of \$905,930, an increase of \$11,199 on the previous financial year. At balance date, 96% of total assets were held in cash or receivables. Current assets coverage of current liabilities is 1.9:1.


INCOME

Total income for the financial year was \$3,392,048. Government funding (65%) remains the primary source of revenue for the Council. Other significant sources of revenue were Fee-for-Service (12%), Events & Activities (12%) and Membership (9%).



EXPENDITURE

Total expenditure for the financial year was \$3,380,849 presented below in the four primary activity areas of the Council. It should be recognised that the nature of the Council's activities are such that individual projects and major events have the capacity to alter individual expenditure areas materially year-on-year.





SOCIAL POLICY

WACOSS mission is to advocate for social change to improve the well-being of all Western Australians, particularly our most vulnerable citizens. The work of our social policy team in researching emerging issues, analysing social policy trends and regulatory reforms and in advocating for a more compassionate, inclusive and effective service system is critical to making this aspiration a reality.

2016-17 PRE-BUDGET SUBMISSION

WACOSS presented its 2016/17 Pre-Budget Submission, Leaving No-One Behind: A Brighter Future for Our Children, Families & Community to the Hon Andrea Mitchell MLA, on 23 October 2015.

In preparing the submission, WACOSS conducted extensive consultations with 194 community sector peak bodies, service organisations, and government representatives across WA. WACOSS consolidated the priorities into a total of 10 strategic policy recommendations and 17 evidence-based and costed budget asks.

This year's submission highlighted the importance of early intervention and prevention, engaging the sector and service users in codesign, and guaranteeing universal access to essential community services. It included a new section highlighting strategic policy recommendations to deliver on reform priorities and improve integration and impact across service systems.



WA PEAKS FORUM

WACOSS continues to convene the WA Peaks Forum as a means of better aligning the policy, advocacy and capacity building efforts of community sector peaks and improving our collective impact.

The Peaks Forum is developing a State Election strategy and website highlighting our shared priorities to deliver better outcomes for the WA community ahead of the March 2017 election.

EMERGING ISSUES

This year's Community Sector Leaders Forum on Emerging Issues on 1 April was attended by close to one hundred members and key stakeholders. It included presentations from Prof. Alan Duncan (Bankwest Curtin Economics Centre), Sue Ash AO (UnitingCare West) and our Director of Social Policy, Chris Twomey. They were then joined by Pip Brennan (Health Consumers' Council) for a panel discussion facilitated by WACOSS President, Steve Joske.

Some significant strategic issues were identified by this year's environmental scan and discussed with the sector. They included: workforce vulnerability, casualization and digital disruption of employment models; the challenges of complex need and entrenched disadvantage and the push for intensive, crossdisciplinary service models that can deliver transformative outcomes; the fragmentation of service funding, with cuts to prevention, early intervention and cross-disciplinary programs arising from budget tightening measures; the marketization of services and the risks inherent behind a push for more competition in community service provision; data linkage, social investment and the challenge of understanding risk factors, targeting early intervention strategies and providing the resulting budget savings; emerging barriers to the delivery of state reforms pursuing service integration and place-based collective impact in regional and youth services; and the increasing divide between federal and state policy and reform directions.

This analysis then provided a basis for follow-up meetings and advocacy, including a briefing of the WA Cabinet, meetings with senior staff of the Department of the Premier and Cabinet and Department of Local Government and Communities, presentations to Boards, other community sector Peaks and even a lecture to postgraduate students at the UWA Law School.



PARTNERSHIP FORUM

A key focus of the Partnership Forum's activities through 2015-16 was further developing partnership approaches to delivering more integrated services. WACOSS has continued to be an active participant in this forum, and the associated Strategy, Funding and Contracting, and Co-design working groups.

The Forum's strategic directions for this period have included a focus on early intervention for vulnerable families, collective impact in the early years and supporting the South West Native Title Settlement, as well as the regional human services and Aboriginal youth service investment reforms.

Following calls from WACOSS for more resourcing to achieve the Forum's strategic directions, the Department of Finance released a one-off Capacity Building Grants program. WACOSS was one of five peaks funded to develop resources to enable best practice in the government and community sector codesign of programs and services in WA. WACOSS is coordinating activity with the Partnership Forum Co-design Reference group and the other funded projects to support the development of a 'co-design toolkit' by the Partnership Forum.

CONNECTING EARLY YEARS NETWORKS PROJECT

The quality of children's earliest environments and the availability of appropriate experiences at specific stages of development are crucial in shaping a child's developmental outcomes. Early Years Networks (EYNs) are community-based and largely voluntary groups which have existed in Western Australia for over ten years. They play an important role in improving outcomes for children in the early years. There are now approximately 50 networks across the state supported by the WACOSS Connecting Early Years Networks Project.



Their members include parents, early childhood educators, child health nurses, library staff, teachers, local government staff, local community organisations and community members.

In 2015 WACOSS received funding from Lotterywest, the Woodside Development Fund and 'in kind' support from the Department of Local Government and Communities to implement a two year pilot project to increase the capacity and improve the sustainability of Early Years Networks, and through them improve outcomes for young children and their families.

During this first year the WACOSS Early Years
Team has focussed on building connections
with and partnerships between EYNs across
the state, and providing a range of training and
professional development activities to build their
capacity and effectiveness. This has included
sessions on strategic planning, understanding the
Australian Early Development Census, connecting
with Aboriginal families, engaging with local
government, and creating social change. The Team



developed a guide for working with Aboriginal families, presented to the Western Australian Local Government Association Conference, partnered with IBN Corporation and Regional Development Australia Pilbara to develop the All Aboard the Spinifex Express project, and developed a Resource Guide for Early Years Networks.

STATE AND FEDERAL BUDGET ANALYSIS

WACOSS delivered its Members' Budget Briefing on 13 May 2016.

Our analysis of the Federal Budget highlighted its inherent unfairness, with cuts to services and support for those who need it, while personal and company tax cuts were being promised.

The State Budget saw increasing costs for tertiary service systems, while overall spending on prevention and early intervention continued to decline.

The lack of funding certainty for community services was seen across both Budgets, including cuts to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander family violence services and community legal services.





SECTOR SERVICES & **DEVELOPMENT**

BUILDING THE CAPACITY OF COMMUNITY SERVICES

A strong and sustainable social and community services sector is a key objective for WACOSS. The role of Sector Services and Development is to assist the community services sector to develop its long term sustainability and to improve effectiveness in the work undertaken across the sector with people who are disadvantaged, vulnerable or at risk within communities.

We provide a range of organisational development services that enhance the effectiveness and viability of community service organisations.

The work undertaken by WACOSS under this team provides practical supports, for example compliance with new regulatory reforms and looking at organisation development needs within the context of social, economic and political trends.

The types of services provided over the past year included: the development of online resources; conferences; forums; professional legal and industry advice; opportunities for the exchange of information and ideas; facilitating networks and providing information supporting best practice in governance and management; and the provision of training and development that build the skills, knowledge and attributes of our sector.


Our ability to translate our policy and advocacy work into practical support for the community sector is critical to the delivery of effective services to the Western Australian community.

TRAINING & CONSULTANCY

TRAINING AND EVENTS

WACOSS continues to provide a range of services developed to meet the needs of organisations working within the community services sector in WA. WACOSS delivers a number of courses on a scheduled monthly calendar in order to build organisational capacity and inform the sector on current and emerging issues. Our training supported 441 different organisations over the past year.





CUSTOMISED TRAINING AND CONSULTANCY

The demand for WACOSS customised training and consultancy remains high. This continues to be a cost effective way to build the capacity of multiple staff and meet organisational needs. The majority of requests continue to be related to Governance as seen in the graph on the right.


WACOSS continues to engage expert trainers and consultants who are leaders in their fields and have a wealth of community sector experience.

DIPLOMA OF LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

WACOSS has continued our long-standing partnership with MODAL in delivering the Diploma of Leadership and Management. The program has helped hundreds of leaders across a wide range of organisations delivering a diverse array of services. This program has added to the quality and value of the services provided to the community more broadly.

Program 13 saw a record number of participants graduate from the course (26 people). In 2016 there was an increase in the competency requirements from 8 to 12 units which significantly increased the scope and value of the accredited training. WACOSS and MODAL are still continuing to structure the program to best provide an optimal learning environment for the participants.



COMMUNITY RELIEF AND RESILIENCE

WACOSS continued to support the Emergency Relief sector in 2015-16 through some difficult times with funding support from Lotterywest. WACOSS supported the sector throughout reforms from both Federal and State Governments in Financial Counselling and Emergency Relief. During this time we coordinated the sector's response, engaged with DCPFS, DLGC and the Minister, undertook political advocacy, and kept the sector informed of developments.

WACOSS maintained our support to the sector through the organisation of the Community Relief and Resilience Forum (formerly known as ER) and State Emergency Relief Committee meetings. Synergy and Horizon Power continued to support the sector with the Power Assist Schemes administered by St Vincent de Paul Society.

Over the past year the program has successfully delivered emergency relief training, actively participated in the Hardship Utility Grants Steering Committee and supported the development of a report Mapping the Charitable Food Sector, in conjunction with Curtin University and The Salvation Army.

UWA LEARNING FOR PURPOSE

WACOSS supported the University of WA Centre for Social Impact in recruitment of agencies taking part in Learning For Purpose. This action learning program involved 14 agencies working over a fourmonth period to address a particular challenge they were facing. As large, medium and small agencies were involved, this was a very significant executive and organisational development opportunity which built the capacity of a variety of agencies.

WACOSS's role included intensive marketing of the program, identification of key community sector leaders (including WACOSS CEO Irina Cattalini) to contribute their expertise on each of the four one-day sessions, and working closely with the program organisers to ensure success of the action learning program. The success of the WACOSS marketing of the program meant that another round of Learning for Purpose to be run in the second half of 2016 was also fully subscribed.

ABORIGINAL HEALTH COUNCIL OF WA OUTCOMES BASED MEASUREMENT

The Aboriginal Health Council of Western Australia (AHCWA) funded WACOSS to undertake part of a Fostering Partnerships and Capacity Building Grant project on "Outcomes Based Measurement Evaluation Planning, Implementation and Reporting for Aboriginal Controlled Health Services" to build their capacity in the development, evaluation and reporting of outcomes for community services procurement and service delivery. WACOSS was part of a joint partnership in the delivery of this project with AHCWA and the Western Australian Country Health Service.

WACOSS delivered training in the Kimberley, South West, Wheatbelt, Great Southern, Mid-West, Pilbara and Kalgoorlie. Two metropolitan courses were also delivered, one of which was a train the trainer course for case managers. As a result of this training, attendees indicated a 30–50% improvement in knowledge of the difference between an input, output and outcome pre and post training. The training was well received with 83% of respondents having their expectations met.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES FAMILIES AND CHILDREN EXPERT PANEL

WACOSS was engaged by the federal Department of Social Services to provide Expert Panel support to the aMaze Parenting Support Service delivered by Bunbury Counselling.

The Expert Panel project recognised that Children and Parenting Support Service Providers, particularly those new to the sector, often require assistance in establishing evidence-based or evidence-informed programs that best meet the needs of their client groups.

WACOSS worked with aMaze to achieve their outcomes through improved program planning and implementation, specifically through the development of client assessment processes and standardised ways of measuring client and family wellbeing. WACOSS supported them to employ a range of tools to plan and evaluate services and measure outcomes for service users.

The outcome of the contract will be a more sustainable organisation providing parenting support in regional WA.

WACOSS ONLINE

RESOURCES & SOLUTIONS

DROPIN

DropIN is the digital embodiment of WACOSS' strategic priority of "sustaining a vibrant community services sector, responsive to the needs of our diverse communities". DropIN is the sector's one-stop-shop for online solutions. The platform was tailor-made for the sector to manage networks, share information and resources, and collaborate.

Over the 2015-16 year, the sector's use of DropIN grew significantly, largely as a result of the new online resources below which were developed and hosted by DropIN.

In an effort to further support the sector, WACOSS developed a new suite of marketing and web development sevices, **DropIN Solutions**, to be available from August 2016.

DropIN Solutions is a cost-effective way for not-for-profits to get their message across. Whether it is a new website, a flyer design, a professional annual report or training about newsletter management, DropIN Solutions will cater to community sector organisations' needs and budgets.

ER CONNECT

With support from Lotterywest, WACOSS launched a real time online emergency relief services directory, ER Connect. The demand for the directory came from the community sector, government agencies and the general public. They were finding it increasingly difficult to navigate complex systems of support. ER Connect provided the perfect online, easy-to-access solution. This comprehensive online directory contains detailed information on 150 emergency relief outlets and financial counselling services, and the number of services in the directory continues to grow.

In addition, through the use of the DropIN community platform, the WACOSS ER program supports the sector with an 'Emergency Relief Space' which is used by WACOSS and the agencies to provide service information and develop new emergency relief networks.



CONNECTING EARLY YEARS NETWORKS PORTAL

The Connecting Early Years Networks Portal is a customised online platform for Early Years Networks across WA. Launched in September 2015, the site has created an opportunity for networks to share their ideas, information and resources with other networks and interested stakeholders across the state. The portal is the result of consultations with the Early Years Networks who expressed the need to have a centralised place to share information and connect online.

The portal provides spaces for Networks to showcase their resources on a personalised space. There is also the chance to see the latest news and training events relevant to the early years. The site is publically available and registrations are open to Early Years Networks, parents, community members and stakeholders who bring value to the sector. The portal is available free of charge and has a growing base of registered users.

ASSOCIATIONS INCORPORATION ACT 2015 RESOURCE CENTRE

The changes to the Associations legislation raised many questions for community sector agencies and WACOSS has been a key provider of knowledge, skills and confidence for agencies to respond appropriately. Under the Fostering Partnerships Program, WACOSS was funded by the WA Department of Finance to assist the Department of Commerce 'Support Strategy for the Roll-Out of the Associations Incorporation Act 2015' project.

The project, (including research, face-to-face information sessions, webinars, online tools, media and direct mail, as well as the dedicated online platform in DroplN), built the capacity of the community services sector by ensuring that organisations understand and are able to meet their governance obligations, particularly in regional and remote areas.

The DropIN resources include a training tool in the form of a 'Test Your Associations Knowledge' quiz and an easy to read summary of the key changes to the Act.

BUDGETLINK COMMUNITY

BudgetLink Community is the outcome of extensive consultation with over 30 organisations within the sector and we thank those who gave their time to assist in its development. The final product combines the accounting wisdom from Crunch Consulting, the technological know-how of Accounting Addons and the expertise of the sector. BudgetLink Community is a non-technical approach designed to assist in financial modelling, full organisation budgeting and forecasting. Community organisations are better equipped to cost and price projects and manage their finances. It can connect popular off the shelf accounting packages, allowing automation of many time consuming tasks. The software is available free of charge to all WA not-for-profit organisations for 18 months.

The BudgetLink Community software project is provided by WACOSS in partnership with the State Government through the Department of Finance.

RECONCILIATION WA

Reconciliation WA has celebrated a very big year. The office relocated from within WACOSS to Cygnet Hall in Crawley. On July 1, 2016 Reconciliation WA began operating as its own Incorporated Association and cut its formal ties with WACOSS.



WACOSS has housed and supported Reconciliation WA for the past three and a half years, and has opened many doors into the community and public sectors to foster the journey of Reconciliation and scale up its depth and breadth throughout the Western Australian community. WACOSS has been a wonderful and solid support to the development of Reconciliation WA, and the relationship between the organisations continues to strengthen.



The appetite for Reconciliation is keen across the State and the uptake of organisations developing Reconciliation Action Plans (RAP) from all sectors of the community is very encouraging. Over one third of the population, either working or studying, do so under an organisation with a RAP. RAPs are a fantastic platform to foster pride and respect in our First Australian culture, and

contribute to developing relationships, building respect and creating opportunities, which we firmly believe is the key to reconciling our State.

Reconciliation WA has again delivered a number of events including the bi-monthly Yokai employment and retention forums, helped deliver Australia's largest Sorry Day, contributed to the delivery of the Rob Riley Memorial lecture, and provided a great experience for people to partake culturally in the City to Surf through the Run for Reconciliation initiative.

Reconciliation WA would like to thank the large number of community organisations that have participated in our activities, assisted us through the course of the year, and have re-enforced their commitment to the reconciliation movement.
